# The God of the Living

Mark 12:18-27

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Mark 12:18-23 ESV And Sadducees came to Him, who say that there is no resurrection. And they asked Him a question, saying, <sup>19</sup> "Teacher, Moses wrote for us that if a man's brother dies and leaves a wife, but leaves no child, the man must take the widow and raise up offspring for his brother." <sup>20</sup> There were seven brothers; the first took a wife, and when he died left no offspring. <sup>21</sup> And the second took her, and died, leaving no offspring. And the third likewise. <sup>22</sup> And the seven left no offspring. Last of all the woman also died. <sup>23</sup> In the resurrection, when they rise again, whose wife will she be? For the seven had her as wife.

### I. Jesus's thoughts are far higher than ours.

## II. Jesus's plan is far better than ours.

**Mark 12:25 ESV** For when they rise from the dead, they neither marry nor are given in marriage, but are like angels in heaven.

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**Mark 12:26-27 ESV** And as for the dead being raised, have you not read in the book of Moses, in the passage about the bush, how God spoke to him, saying, 'I am the God of Abraham, and the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob'? <sup>27</sup> He is not God of the dead, but of the living. You are quite wrong."

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"We should take the teaching and the very words of the Bible very seriously.
